State To Stock Fish In Streams And Lakes

The New York Conservation Department's Division of Fish and Game will stock almost 600,000 pounds of fish in the state's streams and lakes during 1968 according to Conservation Commissioner R. Stewart Kilborna. In 1967, 87 percent of the 22,770, 000 yearling trout that were stocked were eight inches or longer.

These fish are produced in the Department's 18 fish hatcheries and are distributed by truck, plane and helicopter. Transforming tiny eggs into fish large enough for stocking purposes requires skill and technical knowledge, time and special facilities and equipment. Visitors are always welcome at any of the Conservation Department hatcheries which are within easy driving distance for most people. Although the hatcheries are open seven days a week, the best time to view hatchery operations is during regular working hours 8 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday. In most cases the fish are fed twice a day; in the morning and again in late afternoon. While tours are not conducted, personnel working in the hatcheries are used to visitors and welcome their interest in the operations.

Most hatcheries maintain a "display" pool where extra large fish of species produced at that hatchery can be seen. These fish range from the 25 pound "musksies" at

The Conservation Department operates three warm-water hatcheries at Constantia, Ogdensburg and South Otselic. The other hatcheries are devoted primarily to trout production.

Dairymen Paid \$4.79 For June Deliveries

Dairy farmers will receive a uniform farm price of \$4.79 per hundredweight (465 quarts) for June milk deliveries to pool handlers in the New York-New Jersey milkshed, Dr. A. J. Pollard, market administrator, has announced. The May price was \$4.81; \$4.42 was paid in June, 1967.

The producer butterfat differential was set at 6.4 cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above or below the 3.5 percent standard.

Dr. Pollard said receipts from dairy farmers totaled 947,583,813 pounds, a drop of 87,790,858, or 8.5 percent, from June, 1967. Sales of fluid milk (Class I) were down 17,411,207 pounds, or 4.2 percent, to 396,312,652 pounds.

Class I milk accounted for 41.8 percent of the milk that was pooled in June, compared to 40 percent last year, he said. Handlers paid \$6.39 per hundredweight for milk received in the 201-210 mile zone and sold as fluid.

The number of dairymen delivering fell by 3,587 to 29,907, Dr. Pollard said, but average daily deliveries per producer rose 26 pounds to 1,056 pounds.

There was a decrease of 55 to 223 in plants, while the number of handlers fell by 24 to 206 and the number of bulk tank units declined by 22 to 275, he reported.

Receipts at units rose 17,427, 596 pounds to 584,209,119 pounds. The percentage of bulk milk in the pool climbed from 54.7 to 61.7.

June pool milk had a farm value of \$45,680,406.60. The administrator pointed out that this figure does not include all the dif-

ferentials paid to dairy farmers. The uniform farm price of \$4.79 per hundredweight will be paid for milk testing 3.5 percent butterfat and received within 201-210 miles of New York City.

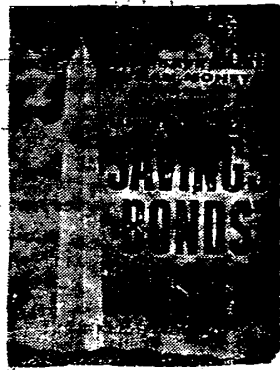
Hiram Howland Family Hold 37th Reunion
