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Southern Tier Expressway Contract Awarded

Gov. Rockefeller has announ-Cov. Rockeleter has announced the award of a con ract for \$12,433,911 to the Hunkin-Conkey Construction Co. of Cieveland, Ohio, for construction of 6.85 miles of the Southern Tier Expressway in the Towns of Randolph and Cold Spring, Cattaraugus County.

The firm submitted the lowest of four bids to the State Department of Transportation. The State's share of the cost of the project will be financed with funds from the Transportation Bond Issue approved by the voters last fall

last fall.

The four-lane expressway with twin 24-foot-wide concrete pavements separated by a median of 100-foot minimum width will be built from West Main Street in the Village of Randolph easterly on new location to Steamburg Road. The project will connect an expressway section under construction in the west with another that is partially complete with two open lanes in the east.

A total of 5.46 miles of across

open lanes in the east.

A total of 5.46 miles of across road work will include construction of interchange ramps at each end of the project and a series of road sections paralleling the expressway to connect local roads. Ten bridges will be built.

Scheduled for completion by December 30, 1970, all work will be under the supervision of Norman W. Krapf, engineer in charge of the Department of Transportation District Office at Buffalo.
