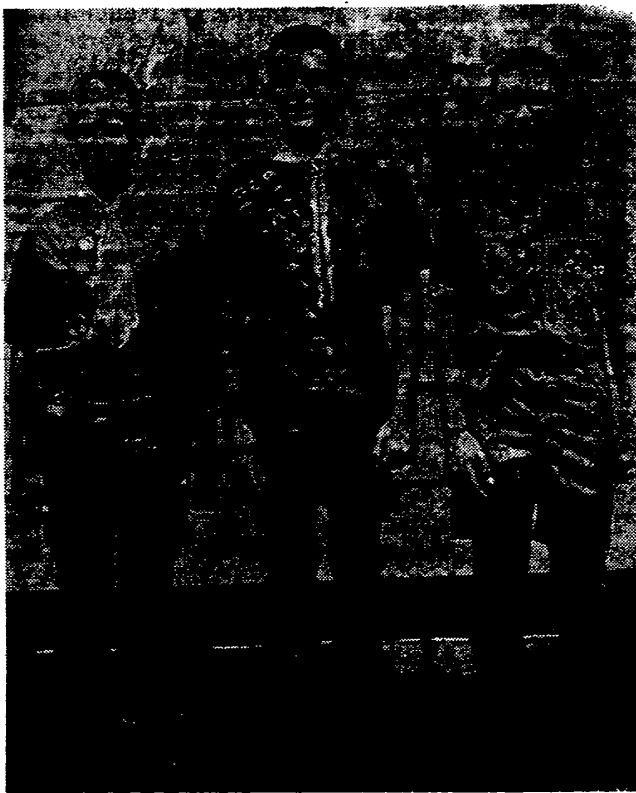
Mrs. Anna Curtis was admitted to the Bethesda Hospital last Thursday for observation and medical treatment.
