New 1968-69 N.Y.S. Hunting & Fishing License

When an estimated 1,500,000 sportsmen apply for their 1968-69 New York State Hunting and Fishing Licenses this year they'll find a new and simplified license waiting for them. It's the first major change in license format in 15 years.

The old licensing system using thirteen separate forms has been replaced by four basic forms: hunting, fishing, trapping and big game. The new licenses will be available at issuing offices by the middle of August. The license year will continue to follow the existing dates of October 1 through September 30.

Conservation Commissioner R. Stewart Kilbourne, commenting on the new licensing system said, "the new design incorporates a number of suggestions received from sportsmen as well as governmental and commercial license issuing agents. The processing of license applicants will be speeded up by eliminating the necessity of agents entering duplicate information on the forms and the simplified accounting systems will make the paper work less burdensome for agents selling sporting licenses."

"Although the licenses have been completely revised there has been no change in license fees," the Commissioner added.

During 1966-67 license sales totalled \$6.1 million. These funds are used for fish and game management programs throughout the state.
