The Tri County Women's Camp and Tour Group will hold a picnic Wednesday, September 11 at 1:00 o'clock at the Friendship Park in Friendship.

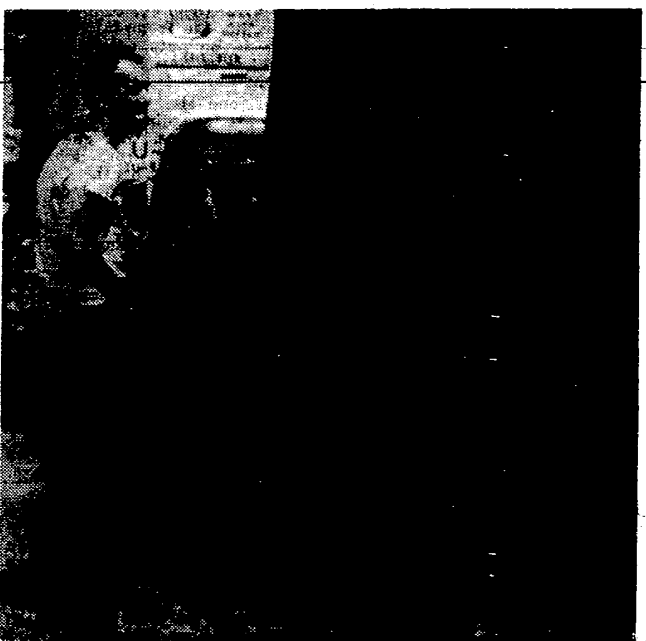
