As we recall, there was over \$400 in the collection with more being added, so that with what was collected in the pits the week before, we would estimate that the total amount would be right around \$600. And, we are sure, that Leo and his family are certainly very grateful and most appreciative for your thoughtfulness.

There certainly was enough action to suit almost everyone — except the drivers that were involved in the crashes. In the Hooligan class, No. 28, did a spectacular roll-over during the Feature coming out of the No. 2 turn — but emerged un-hurt. Although his car had to be towed from the track. There were also several other cars that were in-

involved in roll-overs or spectacular crashes—but our memory matched the weather, (a little on the cold side) so we will have to skip that chapter.

The 40-lap Hooligan Season's Championship Race with a new winner emerging after the lead car was knocked out of the race — and the 2nd place driver that did it — was given the black flag. Jerry Updyke, No. 81, and Skeet Crane, No. U/P, had a rip-roaring battle raging with the lead changing several times until Skeet lost control of his car on the back-stretch and skidded off the edge of the track. In the Sportsman 60-lap Season's Championship Race, the unexpected happened again as Cliff Pierce, No. 45, who was close to lapping the entire field, was involved in a brush with another car coming out of the No. 2 turn — which resulted in enough damage to his car so that he had to drop out of the race. This must have been really heart-breaking to the owner and sponsors of the car since there couldn't have been more than around five laps to go when the accident happened — and, here again, in our opinion, if Cliff hadn't been quite so eager on the gas pedal and bent content to stay in back of Chuck Wright, the No. 2 car — he more than likely would have won the race. In fact, since he had almost a full lap lead on Chuck, Chuck didn't even realize that he had won the race until someone told him as he pulled up by the pits — and then he drove around again to pick up the flag — and the trophy.

In the Modern Feature, Basil Shutt, No. 13, had his engine

patched up enough so that Arnie Flint's efforts with No. 97, just couldn't quite close the gap to get by Basil. In fact, the closest battle during the race was between Phil Pipe, No. 16, Bob Gee, No. 28, and Bill Layfield, No. 121, who finally placed 3rd, 4th, and 5th, in that order.
