Area Planners To Select Consultants

The area planning group consisting of representatives from the Towns of Andover, Wellsville, Scio, and Alma and the Villages of Andover and Wellsville have been meeting for the purposes of selecting a consulting firm that will prepare comprehensive plans and zoning studies for the area. The selection will be made after interviewing four prospective planning consultant firms.

The area planners have met

nterviewing four prospective planning consultant firms.

The area planners have met with Candeub, Fleissig & Assoc., on Aug. 23rd, Kendree and Shephard on Aug. 25th and Metcalf and Eddy on Sept. 5th. The firm of Herbert H. Smith will be interviewed on Sept. 26th.

Once the firm has been selected, each community Planning Board will then proceed to prepare an application for Federal money to assist in paying the cost of the planning studies. This money is made available through title "701" of the Housing Act that provides monetery assistance for local planning studies. Once the planning application is approved, the community in the area will hay 1/6 of the total cost of their respective programs, the State of New York will paly 1/6 and respective programs, the State of New York will paly 1/6 and the Federal Government will pay

the Federal Government will pay 2/3 of the cost.

On the local level, Planning Boards have been in existence for a little over two years. Most of the work to date has been projected toward forming a basis for the forthcoming comprehensive plan. To facilitate the local Town and Village Planning Boards an office has been established in the Andover Free Library.

Village Planning Board meetings will commence on a schedduled monthly basis beginning on Tuesday, Oct. 1st, and the first Tuesday of every month thereafter.
