Services for O. B. Trowbridge, 79, of Park Street, Pulaski, a former justice of the peace, were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday, Oct. 1st in the Congregational Church. Burial was in Riverside Cemetery, Oswego.

Mr. Trowbridge died Saturday, September 28, 1968.

Oliver Bert Trowbridge, a native of Andover, was born Aug. 31, 1889, son of L. M. and Myrtle Davis Trowbridge. He was graduated from Andover High School and Alfred College. He was a teacher at Pulaski High School and also taught at Goshen High School.

He was the first representative of the Oswego County 4-H Clubs and until nine years ago was area manager of the Dairymen's League. He was a member of Pulaski Congregational Church and served 40 years as its treasurer. He was a member of the Andover Masonic Lodge No. 555 F. & A. M., and a past high priest of the Pulaski Royal Arch Masons. He was a member of Pulaski Grange.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Evelyn Scheutzw, formerly of Oswego; a son, Robert L. Trowbridge of Syracuse; six grandchildren; a brother, Lynn Trowbridge of Andover, and a sister, Mrs. Mabel Halsey of Andover.

Mr. Trowbridge served as a justice of the peace for the Town of Richland and also as a Pulaski Village justice.
