I wonder how many students kept up with current events this summer without the history teachers assigning it to them? Well, here's a summary just to help recollect some national and foreign incidents that happened this summer.

June 25 - Canada's Liberal Party won majority seats in the House of Commons elections. The victory meant that Liberal Party leader Pierre Trudeau would continue as Prime Minister.

June 26 - President Johnson nominated Supreme Court Justice Abe Fortas to succeed retiring Earl Warren as Chief Justice. Not until October 7, when the Supreme Court begins a new term, will he know who the Chief Justice will be.

July 1 - The U. S. and over 60 other nations signed a treaty aimed at curbing spread of nuclear arms to lands that don't have them. France and Red China objected. Also, President Johnson announced that U. S. and Russia were planning on starting talks about possible agreement to limit or reduce their own nuclear weapon arsenals.

July 23 - Ten persons, including 3 policemen, were killed, when a sniper battle began a 5-day racial upheaval in Cleveland, Ohio. Racial disturbances continued through the summer in other cities.

August 2 - Congress recessed until after the national political convention. Lawmakers turned down a number of the President's requests, though he obtained certain measures such as a federal tax increase and a new law to help lower-income families obtain good housing.

August 5 - Talks started in Ethiopia, in new attempt to end civil war between Nigeria's central government and the Biafra region of that African land.

August 6 - Dwight Eisenhower had another heart attack.

August 20 - Troops from Russia and 4 smaller East European nations invaded Czechoslovakia to reverse the moves toward political freedom which had been launched by the Czech government under leadership of Alexander Dubcek.

August 22 - Pope Paul VI arrived in Bogota, Columbia. First South American visit by a Pope.

August 26 - Democrats began National Convention in Chicago. The Convention named Humphrey and Muskie as Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates. (By the way, Convention for Republican Party named Nixon and Agnew as Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates.)

August 31 - Major earthquake struck Iran, killing thousands. And as far the Vietnam War - as the Paris talks dragged on, so did the war. Intense fighting during June and July centered around Saigon as Viet Cong forces entered the city and conducted large scale shelling attacks. The fighting had slowed down by the end of July; but flared up again in August.

There's the summary, I hope it aided you in remembering some of the summer occurrences of 1968.

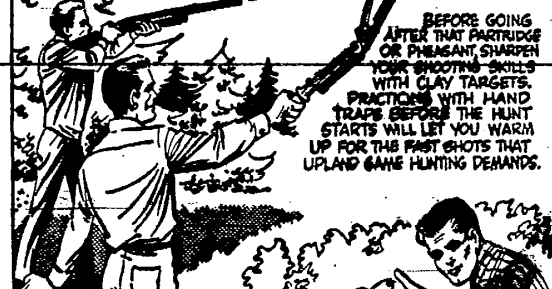
