§ 22. Every law which imposes, continues or revives a tax shall distinctly state the tax and the object to which it is to be applied, and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

The legislature, in implementing this policy, shall include adequate provision for the abatement of air and water pollution and of excessive and unnecessary noise, the protection of agricultural lands, wetlands and shovelines, and the development and regulation of water resources. agricultural lands, wettands and shorelines, and the development and regulation of water resources. The legislature shall further provide for the acquistion of lands and waters, including improvements thereon and any interest therein, outside the forest preserve counties, and the dedication of properties so acquired or new owned, which because of their natural heauty, wilderness charowned, which because of their natural beauty, wilderness char-acter, or geological, ecological or historical significance, shall be preserved and administered for the use and enjoyment of the people. To effectuate any of the purposes of this article, the legislature may authorize any county, city, town or village to contract indebtedness to an amount which shall not exceed two per centum of the average assessed valuation of the real estate of such county, city, town or village subject to taxation, as determined by the last completed assessment roll and the four preceding assessment rolls of such county, city, town or village, for county, city, town or village, for county, city, town or village taxes prior to the contracting of such indebtedness.
