THE SUMMER OLYMPICS

The 1968 Olympic Games (October 12 - 27) officially began Saturday in a setting of old world splendor in Mexico City. For the first time ever, a woman lit the sacred flame that will burn the duration of the games.

The lighting of the flame marked the beginning of two weeks of terrific competition between athletes from all over the world. This year, a record 108 nations are competing, represented by more than 7400 athletes. The United States alone has a delegation of 393.

The thin air of Mexico City has been a major concern for almost every nation, for few of them have as high an altitude as that of the host nation. It's particularly worrisome to those competing in distance running and swimming and many athletes have been in Mexico since early September getting used to the oxygen deficiency.

The Russians have a great deal of confidence in their people. Said Gavril Korobkov, coach of the Soviet track team: "It is no secret that we have strength in the javelin, the hammer, the decathlon, the steeplechase. This team should be more efficient than our last one because it is younger." He says of Mexico City: "The facilities are good. The food is fine. A chicken is a chicken, even in Russia."

It's almost a wonder that the Summer Olympics are even being held. There has been so much chaos, discord, and political strife involved. First there was the boycott threat surrounding the admission of apartheid South Africa; the possibility of a boycott by American athletes and, squabbles over everything. All were solved though, and on Saturday the Czechoslovakian team received the biggest ovation of any foreign delegation.

The Olympic Games have come to be tradition. Let's try to keep them as symbols of strength and truth as the early Greeks wanted them to be.
