

Andover Boosters Win In Third Game

Tuesday afternoon in Fillmore, the Andover Panthers won an up-hill battle to win their third Soccer Title.

The Panthers came from behind three times to tie the score and then settled for a 3-3 tie in an overtime period.

In the first part of the game, Bill Oliver scored the first Fillmore score with Danny Grant coming back in the second period to even the score at 1-1. Then Jim Jeffords put Fillmore back in the lead with another goal in the latter part of the game but Dick Joyce sent the game into overtime play when he scored with a penalty kick at 8:45 of the fourth period.

Fillmore again forged ahead when John Rees scored a goal at the 2 min. mark of the first overtime period — but, Bob Joyce tied the score again just 45 seconds later with the final tally of the game.

R D Carriers Aid In Farm Survey

Rural mail carriers out of the Andover Post Office, and throughout the country generally are distributing to Farmers questionnaires for the 1968 Acreage and Production Survey, Postmaster Rita E. Burns said today.

A joint Federal-State project, this fall survey provides information on acreage and production of major field and vegetable crops harvested in 1968. Information on the number of farmers keeping livestock and poultry is also sought.

Some 21,000 questionnaires are being distributed to farmers throughout New York State. The Post Office and rural mail carriers provide the contact with farmers for the survey. Rural carriers leave questionnaires in mail boxes of a cross section of farmers. Completed questionnaires from New York farmers are forwarded by the Post Office to the Federal-State New York Crop Reporting Service at Albany, New York.

State Orders Andover Dump To Be Closed Soon

The Village of Andover in Allegany County has been ordered by the State Health Department to stop immediately the open burning of refuse and to close the village dump within five months of receipt of the order, Dr. Hollis S. Ingraham, state health commissioner, has announced.

The order is based on a signed stipulation in which the village agreed that sufficient facts exist to warrant such action. The stipulation ended the need for a public hearing in the case.

Until the village closes the dump, it must operate it as a partial sanitary landfill, complying with all sanitary landfill requirements except that compacting and covering will be required weekly rather than daily. Compacting and covering involves crushing refuse and covering it with a layer of six inches of compressed earth or other suitable material.

Within 30 days of closing, refuse must be compacted and covered with at least two feet of material, graded to prevent erosion.

The Department said the dump, 1.7 miles west of the village on Route 17, was improperly operated on various dates in 1966, 1967 and 1968.

The stipulation was signed by Paul Kilbane, Andover mayor.

In a sanitary landfill, refuse must be compacted daily and covered with at least six inches of suitable material. Within a week after final deposits are made in an area, they must be compacted and covered with two feet of material.

In addition, flies, rodent, vermin and other insects must be kept under control; papers and other refuse must be confined to the disposal area by fencing or other suitable means; salvaging of refuse must be regulated to avoid creating a nuisance, and the approach road must be kept open to vehicular traffic throughout the year.

Open-burning is prohibited under the State Sanitary Code and also under the State's Air Pollution Control Rules. Violation of an order can be punished by fines of up to \$1,000 for the violation and \$150 per day for each day the violation continues.

A.C.S. Children Again Take Part In UNICEF On Hallow'en

Mrs. Robert Common is Chairman of the international assistance to governments for the improvement of child welfare, by providing medicines, materials and training facilities in more than 100 countries (UNICEF)

This year the children will be collecting coins in official UNICEF boxes such as those shown on T.V. programs. On Hallow'en night Andover children will exchange thoughtless mischief for the "Hallow'en Magic" of UNICEF.

Here is what your coins can do:

1c — Six large glasses of milk

5c — can buy penicillin to cure 2 children of yaws

10c — antibiotics to cure one child of trachoma

25c — enough BCG vaccine to protect 20 children from TB

50c — can buy DDT to protect 7 children from malaria for one year

\$1.00 — can buy 667-vitamin capsules for mothers and children

75c — enough sulfane tablets to treat one leprosy case for three years

\$5.00 — can buy a school garden kit

Again the Girl Scouts are raising special orange colored boxes for the children's collection on Hallow'en.

Mrs. Common wishes to thank everyone who gave to UNICEF last year. The total was \$149.61 which was more than in 1966.
