Late Flash for all you Hunters — The State Conservation Department announced today that all wild turkey hunting applications for Western New York which were received no later than October 25th will be processed in time for permits to be received by hunters for the November 4 opening day. Applications received after October 25th are being processed and permits will be issued as soon an possible.

The turkey season for Western New York runs from November 4 - 16 and includes Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Chemung, Steuben and part of Eric Counties.
