Monday, Nov. 11, marks the 50th anniversary of the armistice which ended World War I. On that historic day, 50 years ago, a great wave of rejoicing engulfed the world as the guns of mighty armies were stilled. The "War To End Wars" was over; the world had been made safe for democracy. Unfortunately, the dream has not yet become reality. In the succeeding years, Americans have answered three more calls to arms to meet the challenge of forces seeking world domination.

The goal of an honorable world peare is worthy of man's greatest endeavor. There are more than 26 million Americans today who have fulfilled the highest obligation of their citizenship in serving the cause of our Nation toward meeting that lefty goal.

Although Nov. 11, 1968, is the 50th anniversary of the World War I armistice, this year's observance of Veterans Days in no way a consecration of the memory of any past armed conflict. Instead, it is a time to express the asteem and prestige with which Americans regard the role of that

That same veteran knows that there is no such thing as a "war to end wars". But the knows that wars will be ended when force seeking to subjugate markind are convinced that their selfish aims cannot be achieved through armed conflict. conflict.

"Jim" and Doris Ana Jackson certified N.R.A. instructors, with the assistance of Alan Mills, Conservation Officer, successfully concluded their third safety course held this fall last Wednesday night, October 30th.

Current Conservation and huntings laws require every new huntings laws require an N.R.A. certificate stating that they have passed the required test before they can be issued a N. Y. State hunting license. And, since local residents either had to go to Hornell or Wellsville to take this required course and test. "Jim" and Doris Ann took the necessary instruction course that qualified them to teach the "Hunter Safety Course" under the National Rifle Association program to help our local "would-he" hunters obtain their first hunting licenses.

This safety course includes

This safety course includes study of the Conservation Laws, discussion about different types of firearms, emphasis on safety rules, and the proper method of shooting at a target and live game. After the instruction is given students then have to take a written test on his material as well as a test in marksmenship with a rifle (receiving a passir grade) before they can be qualified to receive their "YRA" card enabling them to purchase a hunting "ignase.

According to Conservation Officer Mills, Doris Ann is the only woman instructor in this area at the present time, although another one is applying for certification in the district.
