

School Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The regular meeting of the Board of Education of Andover Central School was called to order Monday evening, November 11 by the President, Mr. Burdick. Mr. Kessler and the following Board members were present: Mr. Burdick, Mr. Godown, Mr. Stephens, and Mrs. Slade.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read for approval. Motion to approve these minutes was made by Mr. Godown. Seconded by Mr. Stephens. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

The Treasurer's report was read for approval. Mr. Godown made the motion that the report be accepted as read. Mrs. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

Mr. Stephens made the motion to send Mrs. Boyer to Buffalo to attend the N. Y. State School Music Association Conference. Mrs. Slade seconded the motion. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

Motion was made by Mrs. Slade, seconded by Mr. Godown, that school board members attend Wellsville meeting, November 19, 1968, relative to school consolidation, as Observers. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

Mrs. Slade made the motion to adjourn the meeting at 10:00 P. M. Mr. Stephens seconded the motion. Carried by 4 votes of yes.

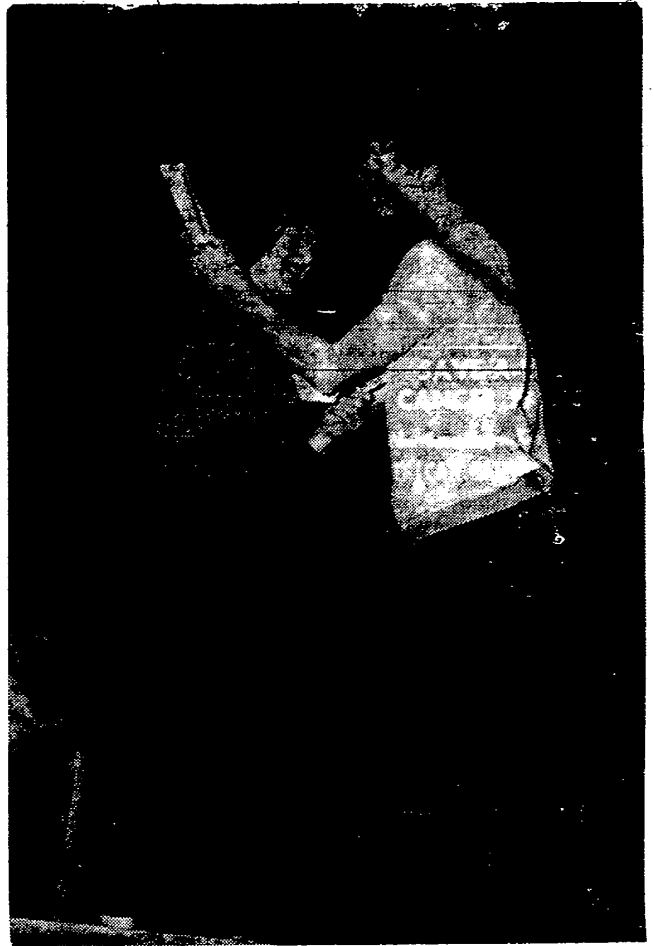
New the weatherman is predicting rain for today and tomorrow, so, its a moot question of how long it will last.
