The Attorney General said com-plaints made to his upstate offices particularly, showed a discernible "pattern" in the tactics employed by such selespen. In a trained by such salesmen. In a typical instance, a salesman at the door offered to clean and inspect a furnace for \$1.4 and then so frightened the home owner by saying the furnace was extre ally dangerous that an agreement was made on the snot to have it revolved.

He also stated that He also stated that in many-cases consumers had saddled them-selves with installment contracts extending over a five-year period, at rates up to 75% over normal costs. He added that fast-talking salesmen made a "specialty" of defrauding elderly people and widows in getting them to sign

widows in getting them to sign such contracts.
SO-O-O Homeowners — don't let yourself be conned into being a "local yokel" by some gyp artist. If you have any qualms or doubts about your present heating system — have it inspected by a dependable area firm that is well established. And, if they say it needs to be repaired or replaced — it wouldn't do any harm to have at least two estimates for the cost of the project — just to be on the safe side.

Then too, with Christmas com-Then too, with Christmas commung up, there may be other door-to-door salesmen or "phony inspectors" coming around to try and relieve you of your money. The best advice that we can give is to CHECK THEIR CREDENTIALS — and tell them you want to check with the local Chief of Police and Bank before you sign any contracts. — or pay out any large sum of money for merchandise.



> State Health Dept. To Relax Burning Rules

ALEANY — The State Health Department disclosed today that it will relax its air pollution control rules to permit local burning of rubbish on the basis of local

of rubbish on the basis of recaroption:

Dr. Hollis S. Ingraham, state health commissioner and chairman of the State Air Pollution Control Board, said the proposal is contained in an amendment to the Board's rules which will be discussed in a series of public hearings next month.

Hearings are scheduled for:

Tuesday, Dec. 10, in the auditroium of the Suffolk County Department Buildings and Grounds, Veterans Highway, Hauppauge.

Monday, Dec. 16, in the auditorium of the State Health Department building, 84 Holland Ave., Albany, and

Friday, Dec. 20, in the auditorium of the Buffalo and Eric County Library Lafayette Square, Buffalo.

Each of the hearings will begin at 10 a. m. The portion of the proposed amendment which would relax the

ban states: "Upon written application and justification by local government, the state henith commissioner may conditionally, wholly or partially exempt any area or portion of an area for open burning of rubbish resulting from on-premise activities of residential occupants of a building or structure containing two or less; dwelling units."

Similarly, the proposed amendment would add exemptions to permit the burning of insect infested or diseased trees and the burning of demolition material, trees and brush from land-clearing operations. Upon written application and

At the same time, however, the amendment broadens the categories of prohibited burning to include leaves and tree needles, plastics, cartons, chemicals, greases, sludges, petroleum products, sawdust, incinerator waste, street cleanings and dead enimals.

In another proposed change, backyard burning of rubbish, already permitted in unincornorated areas of a town of under 30,009 population where there is no public or dute licensed disposal service available would be permissive. Only in towns of under 20,000 population without such service. It is estimated that nine towns

population without such service. It is estimated that nine towns would be affected.

Even permissible open burning would be prohibited if the health commissioner announces a period of high air pollution potential.

Copies of the proposed amendment and an explanatory summary of the recommended changes may be obtained from the State Air Pollution Control Board, 84 Holland Avenue, Albany, 12208.
