Contest Winners Announced By Rod & Gun Club

Andover Rod & Gun Club Officials announced last night that John Ancone from Fulton, N. Y., was the first prize winner of the Club's sponsored deer contest. His deer was an 8 point buck having a 17½" rack spread and weighed 153 pounds field dressed. (The 1st prize was for the heaviest deer.)

Don Weinman from Belmont, N. Y., was 2nd place winner with a 10-point buck having a 15" spread, weighing 152 pounds. (This prize was for the buck with the most points.)

Third place went to Leo Eaton from Wellsville with a 9-point buck having a 21" spread, weighing 152 pounds. (This prize was for the widest spread of the ant-

lers.)
Altogether there were 12 entries in the contest, and, of these, six entries all weighed 152 pounds.
The lightest entry in the contest weighed 103 pounds.
Several local hunters reported bagging deer much heavier and with bigger racks — but were not entered in the contest.
