How To Tell Christmas Trees

Here are some hints from the College of Forestry on how to identify the various species of Christmas trees:

Balsam Fir: Needles are flat-tened, and silvery on the under-sides. The branchlets are soft to the touch because the needles are rounded at the ends.

Douglas Fir is a native of the West and is not really a fir at all. It can be distinguished easily from Balsam Fir by its long pointed

Balsam Fir buds are short, buds.

buds. Baisam Fir buds are short, rounded, and sticky.

Pine trees usually have long needles which are in bundles of two or three on the twig. The species commonly in use in the Northeast have needles in bundles of two three or five. of two, three, or five.

Spruce needles are four-sided, quite stiff, and very sharp to touch. Red and white spruces have needles which can be rolled between the fingers, but Norway spruce is slightly flattened and won't do this.

Remember, the most important thing in buying a Christmas tree is to get one which best suits your purposes and budget. Make sure that the tree you buy is fresh, and have a safe, happy holiday season this year.
