Diane Leon's cat had new kittens.

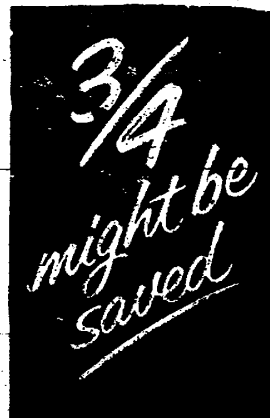
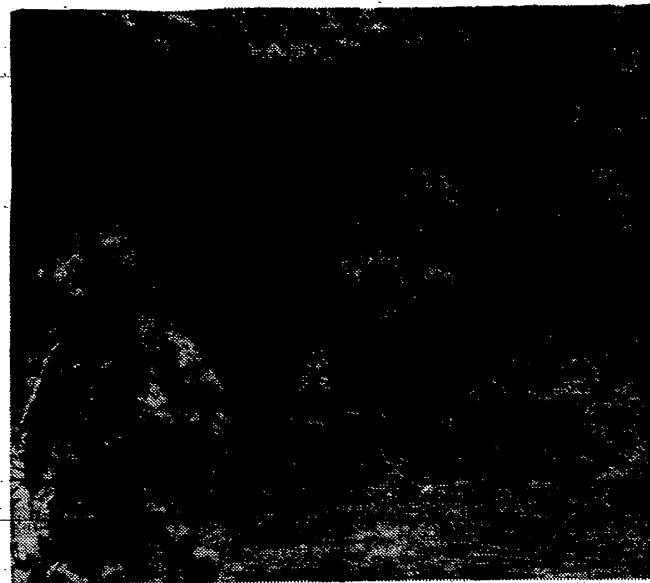
