Sunday morning in a car owned and operated by Bruce D. Greene, of R.D. 1, Genesee, Pa., in a one-car accident on the Wellsville-Stannards Road.

The impact of the crash literally tore the car into two pieces with the engine being torn loose from the front part of the car and rolling around 80 feet away from the other two parts of the car. The front part of the car (as can be seen in the above picture) was torn loose just in front of the firewall, with the rear part of the car wrapping itself around the big elm tree that it hit so that it was less than a foot wide at the deepest point of penetration.

Bruce D. Green, 20, operator of the car was admitted to Jones Mēmorial Hospital suffering from head lacerations and chest injuries with hospital authorities describing him as being in "good condition" on Monday.

Investigation of the accident is continuing by State Police from the Wellsville State Police station and charges are pending, authorities said.
