2 Area Crashes Two Fatalities!

Delbert E. Campbell, 19, a Wellsville youth and nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Ordiway of Andover, was killed instantly around 2 p. m. Sunday morning in a car owned and operated by Bruce D. Greene, of R.D. 1, Genesee, Pa., in a one-car accident on the Wellsville-Stannards Road.

The impact of the crash literally tore the car into two pieces with the engine being torn loose from the front part of the car and rolling around 50 feet away from the other two parts of the car. The front part of the car (as can be seen in the above picture) was torn loose just in front of the firewall, with the rear part of the car wrapping itself around the big elm tree that it hit so that it was less than a foot wide at the deepest point of penetration.

Bruce D. Green, 20, operator of the car was admitted to Jones Memorial Hospital suffering from head lacerations and chest injuries with hospital authorities describing him as being in "good condition" on Monday.

Investigation of the accident is continuing by State Police from the Wellsville State Police station and charges are pending, authorities said.

Woman Dies Of Injuries In Head-On Crash At Onondaga

Mrs. Margaret Griffith of 915 Abietree Park Drive, Mayfield Heights, Ohio, died Sunday night in Jones Memorial Hospital as a result of injuries sustained in a head-on crash at the Onondaga and West streets in Andover on Sunday afternoon.

State Police said that Griffith was driving the deceased's husband's car on Route 17 when she was involved in a head-on crash with a car driven by a man from Genesee, Pa., who was driving west on the same road. The crash resulted in the death of Griffith's wife.

The car was returned to a state of disrepair by a crew of the Andover Fire Department. The car was towed to the Jones Memorial Hospital in Wellsville for treatment. Examination showed that she suffered from a broken pelvis and multiple internal injuries which proved fatal.

Trooper Hennigan of the Wellsville State Police Station, investigating the accident, reported that the weather was clear and the road was dry at the time of the accident.

Local Girl Scouts To Sell Cookies February 7 thru 17

Mrs. Donald Baker, Andover chairman, will help the girls in their troop to sell Girl Scout Cookies to earn money for their troop's programs. They will sell Weston Cookies again this year during February 7 thru 17.

The Southern Tier Girl Scout Council cookie sale is conducted annually by Junior and Cadette Scouts. This is the only council-wide money raising event for Girl Scouts, and proceeds go both to the Girls' troops and to the Council for direct girl-benefit activities only. In the past several years the Council's share has been used for camp development, audiovisual material for program enrichment, troop camping equipment, and special program events.

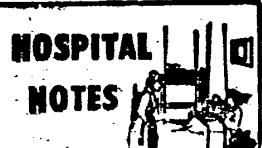
Council goal for the sale this year is 100,000 boxes of cookies, an average of 45 boxes per Scout. Council proceeds of this sale will apply towards the two-year \$20,000. camps development program recently adopted by the Council and to several special area service projects for Senior Scouts serving within the jurisdiction.

Frank Hamm, Jr., of Corning has received a Certificate of Appreciation from the Southern Tier Girl Scout Council. The certificate was awarded by delegates of the council for Mr. Hann's efforts as volunteer Cookie Chairman for the council for the past three years.

Mr. Hamm has long been associated with youth activities. He has three daughters active in Girl Scouting and serves on the Council's camping committee. He was president of the New York State Baker's Association in 1968. He served as chairman of the Jaycee's Soapbox Derby for two years; and he was voted the Jaycee man-of-the-year in 1965.

A baker by trade, Mr. Hamm is in effect in competition with himself while he serves as Girl Scout Cookie Chairman. In the last three years when he has been serving as cookie chairman Girl Scouts in the Council's two-county jurisdiction have sold 208,000 boxes of cookies.
