Mr. and Mrs. Hames will have charge of the dining room and Mrs. Orests from the kitchen. The public is cordially invited to attend.

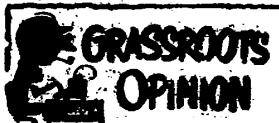
## News That's
