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Chauffeur License Renewals Mailed

Some 150,000 chauffeur license renewal applications have been mailed by the Department of Motor Vehicles to drivers whose licenses expire at midnight, February 28.

Since there is a possibility that a punch card application may not reach the licensee, Motor Vehicle Commissioner Vincent L. Tofany asks all chauffeurs to check the expiration dates on their licenses to see if they are among the 150,000.

If they are, and do not receive the card before February 10, the Commissioner recommends that they contact the motor vehicle issuing office nearest their homes. It may have been delivered there if the post office cannot locate the licensee at the address shown on the card.

If this is the case, he can pick up his renewal application there. If the card has not been delivered to the office, the clerk will notify the Department to send another to the person's home address.

When a chauffeur gets his renewal application, he is urged to complete the renewal process as soon as possible. He may do it by mail to the nearest office or in person if he wishes to take the required eye test there.

Drivers are reminded that Department offices are closed on February 12, Lincoln's birthday.

Clarence L. Burgett

Clarence L. Burgett, 86, died Thursday, January 31, 1969 in Tioga General Hospital, Waverly, where he had been a patient for the past week. He was a former resident of Belfast.

Born January 27, 1884, he was a son of James and Carrie Demore Burgett. Following his retirement from farming, he operated Burgett's Keystone Station, Belfast, selling the business in 1965. He was a member of the Belfast First Baptist Church.

In recent years, Mr. Burgett made his home with his daughter, Mrs. John M. (Rachel) Winnick, of Waverly. He spent winters with his son, Porter H. Burgett in Orlando, Fla.

In addition to his daughter and son, Mr. Burgett is survived by two brothers, Ralph B. and James B. and a sister, Mrs. Nora Higby, all of Andover, and eight grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren. His wife, the former Nancy Lawton, died June 29, 1965.

Funeral services were conducted at the Wolcott Funeral Home in Belfast, Sunday at 2 p. m. with Rev. Dwight Kenyon, pastor of the Belfast First Baptist Church officiating. Burial was in Riverside Cemetery, Belfast.

Read labels when you buy food. You'll be more knowledgeable in your purchasing, more aware of where your money is going.

Prepare foods to conserve their food value and their greatest appetite appeal. Here are some tips: Cook vegetables close to the time of serving, not earlier; and lightly covered in as little water as possible. Cook only until tender. In general, cook high protein foods at moderate or low temperatures. Use meat, egg whites and butter as flavorings, not as staples and other fats.
