"Dear Rod: I heard there was a deer season this year on Long Island. Could this be true? I thought all they had down there were people. W. C., Alfred, N. Y."

Despite considerable controversy, enabling legislation was passed and the state Conservation Department staged a hunt in Suffolk County on 10 weekdays in January. The shotgun only, either sex open season was the first on the island for 41 years.

Apparently the hunting pressure consisted largely of county residents, and somewhere between 100 and 200 deer were taken. Anthony Taormina, regional supervisor for the Conservation Department, called the season "a success" and commended the hunters for their courtesy and deportment. The game biologists are to be congratulated for wisely managing the deer herd on Long Island, and preserving some hunting under difficult conditions.

Rehashing the deer season, a popular mid-winter sport in itself, brings to mind some of the best stories I've heard in a long time. They come from Jean E. Fisher, director of the New York Ranger School at Wanakena, part of the State University College of Forestry in Syracuse. The students there have a real deal. The school property is 2,680 acres of forest on Cranberry Lake, so that hunting, fishing, canoeing, camping and the like are popular week-end activities.

Many of the students hunt-deer for the first time during their year at school. Jean described to me what happened to a few of them. Certainly the luckiest student

of the year was a Monroe County youth who had never done much shooting, but his enthusiasm was fired by dormitory bull-sessions devoted to Adirondack hunting. He borrowed a double-barreled shotgun from a brother, and expected to hunt only grouse and rabbits. One Saturday while his friends were scouring mountain and swamp for deer, he shuffled along a trail with eyes peeled for small game.

A six-point buck jumped out of the brush, stopped and looked back at him. The student broke his gun, took out the scatter loads, fished around his pockets for his only slug, and, you guessed it, dropped the buck in his tracks. His comment, "I don't see anything tough about deer hunting, Mr. Fisher."

Another lad, this one from Long Island, shot an early season buck before snow was on the ground. "If you could picture him dragging it on a dry road with his belt," Jean said, "while trying to hold his pants up, you'd not soon forget it." The pure exertion of it all had turned his face red as a turkey gobbler's. But he was smiling.

The award for the most enterprising hunter goes to a youth who shot his first deer early one Sunday morning. Not knowing exactly what to do next, he ran over a mile back to school. Bursting with excitement he routed a faculty member before Church, and convinced the professor he should use his car and help him in with the deer.

"If that boy stays in forestry," Fisher commented "the world may have lost its greatest salesman."

Greenwood Central School Board adopted a statement relative to school district consolidation. The Board discussed and formulated a letter to be sent to our local legislators, committee chairman in education and finance, and the governor relative to the school's feeling on the proposed state budget and school district reconsolidation.

A refund was approved to the American Legion for an overpayment that they made on their 1968-69 school tax.

Charles Smith was appointed to act as Greenwood's representative to the public relation committee for B.O.C.E.S. This committee will be active over the next several months while the county will be considering the proposed vote on the B.O.C.E.S. referendum.
