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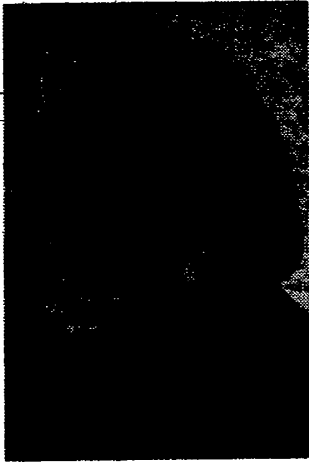

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Two Seniors Win New York State Regents Scholarships



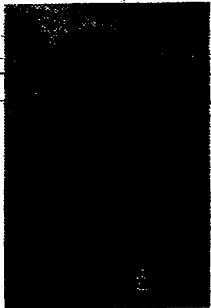

From this year's graduating class, two seniors are to be commended, one for having been named as an alternate for a New York State Regents Scholarship and the other for a Nursing Scholarship. The two honored students are Elizabeth Ulah who is an alternate for a New York State Regents Scholarship and Mary Howland who has been designated as the winner of a New York State Nursing Scholarship.

The Regents Scholarship Examination for these scholarships was written by approximately 175,000 high school seniors in about 1,200 secondary schools of the state in October.

There are a total of 18,843 Regents College Scholarships awarded this year. The number allocated to each county is determined by the ratio of the number of high school graduates in each county to the total number of graduates in the State last year. Allegany County received 63 Scholarships.

The holder of each of these scholarships will be entitled to an annual award of \$250 to \$1,000,

depending on financial need, for each of four years of his college course while attending any college in the State of New York approved by the Regents for this purpose. In addition, scholarship holders may be eligible to receive scholar incentive awards of \$100 to \$500 up to the cost of tuition.

Elizabeth Ulah, the daughter of Mrs. Lonnie Beagle, is an alternate for a New York State Regents Scholarship. Elizabeth has majored in math, science, and art. She will pursue a course in sociology, possibly at Alfred University or Wells College.

The recipient of the Regents Scholarship for Basic Professional Education in Nursing is Mary Howland, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Howland. Mary has a major in math science and language. She will be enrolled in Elementary Education in either Rosary Hill or Cortland.

The names of 600 high school pupils who have received these Regents Scholarships for Basic Professional Education in Nursing have been released. The holder of one of these scholarships will be entitled to an annual award of \$200 to \$500, depending on financial need for each year of study in a registered professional nursing course.
