



CABIN FEVER SEASON

Crows are flying around squawking as if spring were in the air. They know something that house-bound sportsmen find hard to realize this time of year. Spring is coming. Just be patient and hang on a little longer.

But what do you do in the meantime? Your reels are all cleaned and oiled, and you've checked rod windings. The old tackle box has been sorted, and order restored. Now what?

Well, for the hardy breed, there is ice fishing. There may be some argument as to whether this is really fishing or not. But I claim it's fun, and ice fishing will cure a good case of cabin fever.

I've just returned from a day on Sandy Pond, a bay off Lake Ontario in Oswego County, where the perch are running small but succulent. But the few hours spent outdoors were worth more than the fish.

Perch are the center of attention right now, and provide the bulk of ice fishing in New York. A few reports are coming in from Chautauqua and Erie Counties, where some good catches are being made on Lake Erie. Minnows are the usual bait.

A great deal of upstate ice fishing centers around Lake Ontario, and an occasional pike is added to catches here, especially in the western end. The proportion of pike increases as you fish St. Lawrence River hot spots.

Smaller lakes provide unnumbered perch fishing opportunities. If all this sounds a little too dull, you might try trout fishing:

How's that? Yes, limited mid-winter trout fishing has been possible for a few years in New York. You will have to do some exploring. It's so new that not much is known about lures, techniques, or locating trout. But it's all there if you have an adventuring spirit.

Rainbow trout are legal in Schroon Lake in Essex and Warren Counties. Or you might try for lake trout, and landlocked salmon in Hamilton County's Seventh Lake. Big Moose Lake in Herkimer and Hamilton Counties, and Millsite Lake and Lake-of-the-Woods in Jefferson County harbor lake trout, and other species.

Check your 1968-69 Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide for details and the list of lakes where ice fishing for trout is legal. One thing is certain, you will not be crowded by other fishermen this time of year.

One tip reaching this column, is that Chuck Landers at Beaver Lodge, Seventh Lake, keeps his finger on ice fishing catches in that area. Several anglers have had some luck near the inlet of Seventh, on the east side of the big island.

Now, be honest. Wouldn't a nice lake trout or landlocked salmon make spring seem a little closer?

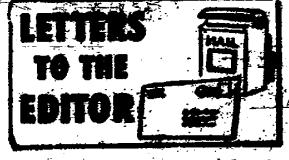
