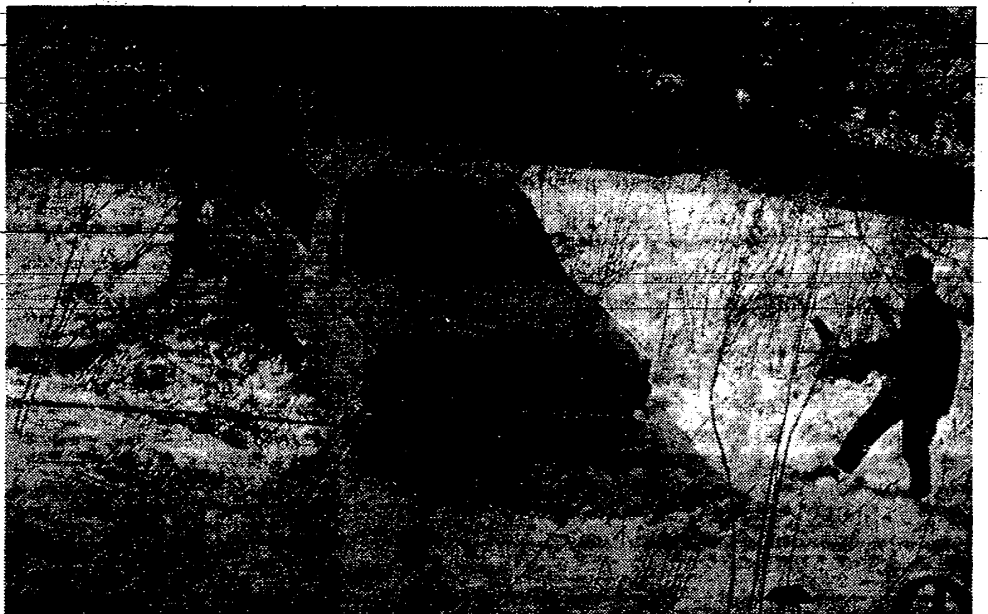
A.C.S. Announces 1969 Valedictorian and Salutatorian

Ralph Miles, age 80, of 25 Maple St., Andover, N. Y., narrowly escaped injury when his car was struck in the rear by a hit and run driver around noon, Saturday, March 8th.

In a statement issued to the Press shortly after the accident, Mr. Miles reported that he was driving North in his late model auto on Route 21 near Tip Top, slowed down, turning on his direction signals preparing to turn in to the parking lot of the Pine Crest Poultry Farm when his car was struck in the rear by another vehicle traveling in the same direction which failed to stop.

The force of the impact drove the Miles car thru the parking lot

and over a 20 foot embankment where it came to a stop on a small plateau without rolling over. Fortunately for Mr. Miles, his car stopped at this point because if it had gone only a few feet further it would have continued down over another steep embankment and probably would have landed on the railroad tracks which were below.

Glenn Thorp operating his wrecker from Thorp's Atlantic, cautiously winched the Miles car up over the steep embankment and, despite the fact that the car was able to be driven away from the scene of the accident, it appeared as if extensive damage to the car had resulted from the

effect of the crash.

Troop George W. Knight from the Wellsville State Police Station investigated the accident and according to the police report, a summons was lodged against Donald Logan, 58, 22 E. Main St., Andover, N. Y., for: Leaving the scene of an accident without reporting; Driving at speed not reasonable and prudent; and Following too closely. Trooper Knight was assisted by Patrolman Donald Torcaro of the Hornell Police Department.

Mr. Logan was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Vic Cornelius of Alfred Station where he pleaded not guilty to the charges, with a trial set for a later date.

Mr. Glover's address was listed as Hakes Ave., Hornell. He died of multiple lacerations and internal injuries as a result of being thrown from a car driven by Lani Barros, 21 of Canaseraga, according to state police.

Survivors include his father, Homer Glover of Randolphville and his mother, Mrs. Doris Gordon of Friendship; maternal grandmother, Mrs. Mary Snyder of Hornell and paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mae Glover of Andover.

Also surviving are one sister, Mrs. Mary Otto of Friendship; two half-brothers, Homer Glover of Rochester and David Glover of Hornell and a half-sister, Beverly Daggert of Detroit, Mich.; two step-brothers, Douglas Gordon and Thomas Lamb of Friendship and five step-sisters, Judy, Ann, Susan and Robin Gordon and Tammy Lamb, all of Friendship. Services were held at the Crandall and Crandall Funeral Home in Hornell Monday with burial in Rural Cemetery in Hornell.

A Funeral Mass was celebrated Friday, March 7 at Our Lady Help of Christians Church at Albany and interment at Beacon, N. Y.

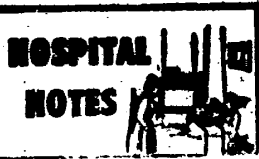
