Senator Jess Present Proposes Police Bill

Candidates for police forces in villages with a population of ten thousand or less may be accepted up to age thirty-five. This was proposed by State Senator Jess J. Present (R-Jamestown) in a bill which this week passed both the State Senate and Assembly and now awaits the Governor's signa-

The current civil service law of the State of New York limits police appointments to ages not less than twenty nor more than twenty-nine, making it nearly im-possible for some villages to se-cure applicants for their police force according to Senator Pres-ents.

Of the 485 New York State vil-

Of the 485 New York State villages with populations under 10,000, 415 have populations under 3,590 he said.

There need be no weakening of our law enforcement system by this new law, Senator Present said, because of the strict physical requirements and rigid training courses which must be met by applicants.
