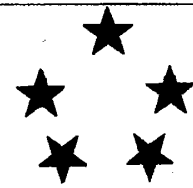

last week in Albany Republican Assembly Speaker Perry B. Duryea, promised to have a compromise state budget ready for debate and a vote by April 1.

That promise may be wishful thinking.

Duryea's problem is not upstate, as one might expect, but from his neighbors in Nassau County.

Duryea, Republican Senate Majority Leader Earl W. Brydges of Niagara Falls, and Governor Rockefeller have been working for weeks on a recommendation to the governor's original \$6.7 billion budget.

It will be remembered Rockefeller came out with a \$6.7 billion budget, then told the Legislature it was out of whack and asked them to line it up by cutting his recommendations by five per cent across the board on the one hand and by hiking the state's two per cent sales tax to three per cent on the other.

The five per cent plan was dropped when Duryea objected. It was replaced by a program of "selective" cuts — the primary purpose of which was to save welfare and education.

It was not enough. Last week the Nassau County delegation, made up of eight Republican assemblymen and five Republican senators, told both the governor and Duryea they will not vote for any budget which in any way cuts state aid to local school districts.

Until two years ago that kind of rebellion came only from Central New York.

But last year the Nassau County delegation balked and state aid

To further compound Duryea's problems, there is opposition to the sales tax hike from all over the state — particularly from those legislators who favor the combined state and local sales tax is now at five per cent, and would go to six under the bill.

Nassau County Republican Assemblyman Joseph Maciotta, who is also GOP county chairman there, gets an "A" in math. It takes 75 votes to pass a bill in the Assembly. In January everyone was confident the session would be a short one, that it would end before Easter.

This week Duryea, Brydges and the Governor will be working to come up with a compromise plan that everyone can vote for.

It's going to take longer than a week to do that.

Some kind of agreement can be reached on education dollars. But the sales tax issue is another thing.

Democrats — who ironically enough started the tax when they controlled the Legislature in 1965 — and now solidly against it. Stanley Steingut, the boss from Brooklyn who heads the Democratic minority in the Assembly, has put his image and power on the line against it — meaning no Democrat will vote for it.
