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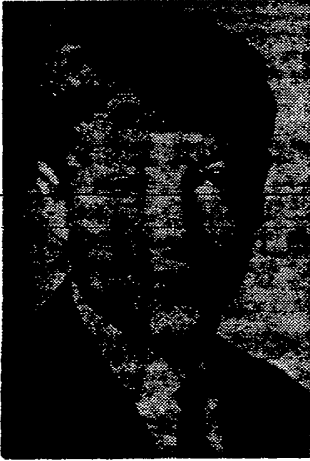

While enroute to Washington, a stop will be made in Gettysburg for a visit to the Electric Map. The Seniors will arrive in Washington, D. C., approximately at 5:30 at the Hotel Lafayette where rooms will be assigned.

Then to Mount Vernon for a tour and finally a stop will be made at the Jefferson Memorial. The afternoon will be spent at the Smithsonian Institute where there will be ample time to visit the various buildings. In the evening, we are scheduled to go to the Wilson Line Pier for our evening cruise down the Potomac River to Marshall Hall Amusement Park.

Thursday then appears and we will climb aboard the sightseeing coach for the drive to the Washington Monument where a stop will be made for our journey to the top for a brilliant view of our Nation's Capitol. From here we go to the White House for one last look before our return to the hotel.
