Probably the most "timely and touchy" news item in the "Headlines" is the Rabies Emergency that has been declared in Allegany County.

There is no doubt that this measure is necessary, and if just 1 child's life is spared from a tortuous Rabies death, it is well worth all the precautionary measures. And, for those people that don't want to co-operate, perhaps it could be arranged to have them view a movie of the suffering of a victim dying from Rabies — and maybe they would change their mind fast — because it could happen to anyone!

At any rate, in discussing the problem with our newly elected Mayor, he stated that he wished to issue the following statement in behalf of himself and the Village Board: "It is requested that all dog owners co-operate with the Health Department Pet Control under Public Health Law Title IV for the duration of the Rabies emergency in Allegany County."
Furthermore, residents are reminded that under the State Conservation Law, it is illegal to discharge a firearm within 500 feet of a building, and that if there are any complaints to violations of this control measure they should be reported to the local Police Department.

No Dogs 'On Loose' Health Office Says

The new York State Department of Health has certified three recent cases of Rabies in Allegany County and as a result has put a "Rabies Control Act" into enforcement.

Dr. Howard Fabry of the New York State Department of Health, Rochester Regional Office, today informed us that as a result of the certification of 3 Rabies cases in Allegany County, two in wild animals and one cow, the "Rabies Control Act" has been put into effect in Allegany County.

Dr. Alan L. Folsom, Health Officer for the Town and Village of Andover, stated today that the declaration by the Health Department automatically invokes pet controls under Public Health Law Title IV, Article 21, particularly aimed at control of dogs for the duration of the rabies emergency in the county, which of course includes the Town and Village of Andover.

Specifically, the law states that it shall be unlawful for any person owning, boarding, or otherwise keeping a dog within the county, to permit such dog to be elsewhere than on his own premises, or on the premises of another with the knowledge and consent of the owner.

Under certain conditions designated by the Commissioner, dogs that have been immunized may be permitted to be at large. HOWEVER, this is not the case under the present emergency — SO, IF YOU DO NOT WANT TO RUN THE RISK OF HAVING FIDO DISPOSED OF — KEEP HIM AT HOME !!!

Dr. Alan Folsom, local Health Officer, has had the notice of the existence of Rabies in Allegany County published, together with a copy of PUBLIC HEALTH LAW, TITLE IV, Article 21, Section 2140 to Section 2143 inclusive as required by law, in this week's issue of the Andover News.
Thus, anyone found in violation, will be subject to the penalties as prescribed under such sections
