#### Paying Tow Taxes With One Check Can Lead To Erroneous Bills

Anyone paying two Federal taxes at the same time should be sure to pay them with separate

sure to pay them with separate checks.

John E. Foley, District Director,

Service, Buffalo, Internal Revenue Service, Buffalo, asks all taxpayers who make such payments to use segarate checks or money orders to avoid possible

ling errors. Under the IRS processing sys-Under the IRS processing system, taxpayers who send one may-ment for two returns sometimes discover their account is not prop-erly credited. The entire payment could be credited to one tax and a bill issued for the other.

Mr. Foley said, "If one ched money order is sent for two types of taxes, for example, a 1969 estimated tax payment and a 1968 tax balance due and the two returns are separated for processing, turns are separated to processing, the payment might be credited to one tax, leaving the other tax un-paid." He explained that in such a situation one tax would be over-paid and a refund issued, while on the other tax a bill would be sent

the other tax a bill would be sent to the taxpayer.

Mr. Foley suggested that taxpayers put their Social Sccurity Number on all checks or money orders sent to IRS, to make sure the payment is credited to their account. Business taxpayers should put their Employer Identification number on their checks. number on their checks.

number on their checks.

Taxpayers are reminded to be sure to compute the 7.5 percent surcharge on line 12b if filing a 1040 form and on line 8b on the 1040A form. Failure to include the surcharge accurately will delay refunds and cause recomputations.
