Legal Notice NEW YORK STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH Albany SUPPRESSION OF RABIES BY LOCAL BOARDS OF HEALTH

Public Health Law
Title IV, Article 21
SECTION 2140. Rabies; prevention of the spread.

1. Whenever the disease known as rabies shall exist in any county or in the vicinity thereof, and the commissioner shall so certify to the health officer of such county or any local health district contained therein, it shall be the duty of such health officer immediately to publish a notice of the existence of such disease, together with a copy of this section, and sections two thousand one hundred forty-one to two thousand one hundred forty-three, inclusive, of this chapter, in a newspaper generally circulated within such county, or local health district contained therein or by posting in several conspicuous places, or by both such publication and posting.

2. Until the commissioner shall have certified that rabies no longer exists in such county or local health district and due notice shall have been given, it shall be unlawful for any person owning, boarding or otherwise keeping or having in his custody a dog within such county, or local health district, to permit such dog to be at large elsewhere than on the premises of the owner except that it be on the premises of another person with the knowledge and assent of such other person; provided, however, that subject to conditions prescribed by the commissioner and in areas designated by him, a dog which has been actively immunized against rabies may be permitted to be at large.

SECTION 2141. Rabies; dogs at large; violation and penalty.
Any person owning or harboring a dog and who shall permit such dog to be at large in violation of the provisions of section two thousand one hundred forty of this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of not to exceed twenty-five dollars for the first offense, and for each subsequent offense to a fine of not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail for not to exceed twenty-five days, or by both said fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 2142. Rabies; dogs at large; seizure and disposal; reports.
1. During the period when the

disease known as rabies shall exist in any county or in the vicinity thereof as certified by the commissioner pursuant to the provisions of section two thousand one hundred forty of this chapter, any duly appointed dog warden or any peace officer shall and any other person may seize and confine or kill any dog found at large in violation of this article.

2. Any person confining or killing a dog under the provisions of this section shall immediately report in writing the facts relating thereto to the local health officer. Such person shall not be held liable for damages for killing a dog found in violation under the provisions of this section, provided that the facts relating thereto have been reported to the health officer as herein required.

3. The local health officer shall forward the report or a copy thereof to the department.
