



If you have noticed any moths outside in the cool spring air, chances are they are the male moths of the cankerworm bent on their destructive defoliation cycle. The two species of cankerworm, spring and fall, attack a wide range of common deciduous forest, shade, and orchard trees, including such hardwoods as elm, apple, and oak.

A serious outbreak of this pest occurred last year in 13 counties of New York State where trees were stripped bare of all leaves. Although the degree of defoliation is not expected to be as severe this year, the cankerworm still presents a problem to large stands of timber as well as to the property owner with only a few prize trees. Trees that are attacked may be completely defoliated by the voracious feedings of these caterpillars (the larval stage). Repeated attacks by this

pest for two or three years in succession seriously weaken or destroy the trees.

The State University College of Forestry at Syracuse University is offering an illustrated leaflet describing the two species of cankerworm and detailing effective control measures. The publication was prepared by Dr. Howard C. Miller, tree pest specialist at the College. The publication should be of benefit to the individual property owner as well as to owners of forest acreage.

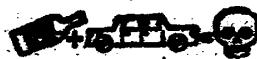
**Navy Now Accepting Applications**
