**Greenwood Central School News**

The Greenwood Central School Music Department will hold their second concert April 25, at 8:00 P. M., in the gymnasium.

This concert will consist of the second grade rhythm band; Junior Band; Junior High Girls' Chorus; Senior High Mixed Choir; Senior High Girls' Choir.

Mrs. Barbara Duke and Mrs. Jure Rollins, Music teachers, are in charge of the concert.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Education held recently at the Greenwood School, all members were present.

Principal Hoagland reported to the Board that a public hearing will be held in the Greenwood School on Wednesday night, May 14, at 8:00 P. M. is for the purpose of explaining the BOCES referendum to all interested voters in the area. On May 20 a vote will be taken relative to the Steuben County B.O.C.E.S. facilities at Hornell and Corning. The Board voted to recommend to the Steuben County B.O.C.E.S. Board that a five year plan, for paying off the construction bonds, be used since this seems to indicate considerable saving to the tax payers.

Negotiations with the faculty under the Taylor Law were discussed and the Board of Education voted to present a proposal to the faculty for their consideration. The proposal calls for a salary of \$6400 at Step B1 with \$250 increments throughout the salary schedule at all levels required by the state. A longevity increase is provided at Step 20.

It was voted to cooperate in the bread bidding of the Southern Tier schools again this year.

A special meeting was planned for Monday, April 21 at 7:30 to discuss other business relative to salaries and staffing in the school for the coming year.

A Special Meeting of the Board of Education held April 21 at the Greenwood Central School.

The main purpose of the meeting was to discuss staff and curriculum plans for the 1969-70 school year and how the Greenwood Central School should adjust to reduced state aid for the coming year.

Mr. Hoagland, Supervising Principal, was directed by the Board to send a letter to the Steuben County B.O.C.E.S. requesting shared services in some areas and a reduction of B.O.C.E.S. services in other areas. All recommended changes are tentative at the present time and will depend on suitable sharing areas with other schools. The first priority of the School Board was to preserve as much of a curriculum area as possible in the face of declining state aid.

In addition to the changes being considered under the B.O.C.E.S. program it was voted to reduce the school nurses' position to a half time position and reduce girls' physical education from three days to two days per week.

The elimination of some services at the elementary level may also be possible as the size of our classes becomes more uniform and a smaller first grade becomes available for next year.

A resolution was passed to place the special education program, now being conducted by the Greenwood Central School, under the Steuben County Board of Cooperative Services for next year.

Reservation for the School Board meeting to be held at Arkport on May 15 were authorized, and the meeting was adjourned.
