Injuries Fatal To L. I. Man

Joseph Zaremba, 77, of 3 Highfield Drive, Huntington, L. I., died at 4 a. m., Tuesday morning as a result of injuries suffered Saturday in a one-car crash around 2 miles West of Andover on Route 17.

According to the accident report, Mrs. Anthony Maurer, accompanied by her husband and father, the deceased, was driving West on Route 17 at 12:55 p. m., when the accident occurred. As Mrs. Maurer pulled out to pass another car with their brand new Ford station wagon just West of the Andover Village dump, she noticed another car approaching from the opposite direction that had appeared out of a slight dip where it had been hidden from view. When she swerved back to her right hand side of the road, she lost control of the heavily laden vehicle which left the North side of Route 17, striking a barn in front of the old Hann Homestead, rolled over several times and finally came to rest on its top as pictured above on the North shoulder of the road.

Mr. and Mrs. Maurer and Mr. Zaremba, her father, were rushed to the Jones Memorial Hospital in Wellsville in the Andover Fire Department Ambulance manned by members of the emergency rescue squad with other members of the Andover Fire Department directing traffic at the accident scene.

According to a hospital report later, Mr. Zaremba who had been placed in an intensive care unit and was listed in fair condition, suffered a fractured hip, multiple fractures of one leg, broken ribs, internal injuries and shock. Mr. Maurer suffered abrasions, contusions and possible fractures while Mrs. Maurer's injuries were listed as severe abrasions and contusions with the latter two listed in "good" condition.

The three Long Island residents reportedly were on a vacation trip to Michigan after purchasing the new car and had stopped here in Andover to change drivers just before the accident happened.

The impact of the crash when the car hit the barn was so great that it tore the entire corner of the structure away as well as part of the side, with the vehicle then hitting a low stone wall which may have caused it to roll over.

It is understood the Henry Armentieri, of 75 Elm St., Hornell, had recently purchased the property on which the barn stands and had made plans to restore the
