### Feature

It is almost impossible for an American to visualize the diet on which most of the world exists. Imagine if you can, a medium size portion of rice or cereal with a few local vegetables and possibly some fish — eaten only twice a day. On most days that's all there is. Occasionally there may be tea and perhaps a little sugar and once in a great while a small amount of chicken or meat. However, in a country like India, the average consumption of meat is an almost non-existent two pounds per person per year. Three quarters of all the people on the earth today have never in their whole lives eaten what Americans call a square meal — meat, potatoes, vegetables, bread and butter, dessert and a beverage.

One million people are added each week to the earth's total. By all odds the greatest number of these fight for life in underdeveloped areas. India is adding 14,000,000 people a year and may be half a billion in population by now, though no one really knows. Even though the United States is sending millions of tons of surplus grain to keep starvation away from that hot, poverty-stricken country, the recent drought and the present population increase of the past two years has made our aid merely a drop in the bucket.

Is there no solution to this problem, or can something be done about it? Many people are acquiring pessimistic attitudes but I refuse to accept this outlook. I have the hopeful belief that the twentieth century will not be remembered so much for the first exploration of outer space, or the discovery and use of the atomic bomb as a weapon of war. BUT for being the time when mankind began to seriously think it practicable to distribute to all the people on earth all the benefits of a civilized world.

To fight against food shortages, leading agriculturalists and some political leaders everywhere have been working with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. This nation's war against hunger has been a success. I am sure that the use of fertilizers, new strains of

rice that yield extra crops each year without damaging the soil, greater attention to the ample amount of protein to be found in the world's oceans and seas, genetic improvement in livestock, new sources for fresh water — these are just some of the things I have learned that the FAO has accomplished since its origin on October 16, 1945.

Yes, progress IS being made! The marine life that fish feed on, is already being brought ashore for the edible use of human beings. Modern methods of agriculture and scientific fishing, new grains and new ways of growing old ones, better distribution from areas of surplus to areas where food is needed — these are all optimistic outlooks on the solution of food shortage. But above all, we are definitely becoming aware that HUNGER is still an enemy and we all are involved with the problem!

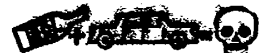
