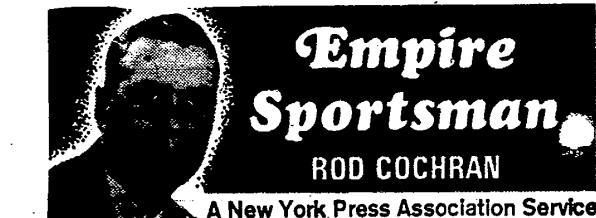

Greenwood Central School News

The Greenwood Central School announced today that two senior boys are the valedictorian and the salutatorian of the 1969 graduating class.

The valedictorian with an average of 89.72 is Terry Hunt, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hunt, of Greenwood, New York. He is a member of the National Honor Society and has been active in Student Council. Terry has been outstanding in his athletic achievements over his four years in high



As readers of this column learned in January, New York is in the midst of the controversy between citizens concerned about environmental pollution on one side, and the Atomic Energy Commission and power companies licensing and building nuclear power plants on the other.

The NATIONAL OBSERVER, in covering the situation on February 3, stated, "And it is here — Far above Cayuga's waters — that one of the major conservation battles of the nuclear age is being fought."

"What literally may become the 'hottest' conservation fight in the history of the U.S. has begun," said SPORTS ILLUSTRATED in its January 20 issue. "The fight is over nuclear power plants and the damage they can inflict on the natural environment."

It is difficult to sum up this "conservation war" in a single column for EMPIRE SPORTSMAN. But the current battle is over a plan to erect a \$170 million nuclear generating plant on the east shore of Cayuga Lake, by the New York State Electric and Gas Co. It is claimed that this would be the first such plant built in the U. S., using a relatively small, slow-flushing lake for cooling purposes.

Some 9,000 gallons of water PER SECOND would be withdrawn from Cayuga, and then discharged back as hot water. This is called thermal pollution, and has been known to kill fish, destroy spawning grounds, and extend the growing season for algae and water weeds. A blue-green algae

that may occur gives a bad taste to drinking water, and is reported to give off such a stench that it has peeled paint from houses.

Recirculating water from deep in the lake to near the surface has a fertilizing effect, by withdrawing nitrates and other chemicals from an "inactive zone" and bringing them up to where aquatic growth is stimulated.

Further, the recirculated water will be slightly radioactive. This continuous release is very small, and is considered harmless at that dilution. But I've seen on studies that would determine whether or not an accumulation of radioactivity would occur in the bodies of the larger fishes, as is the case with certain pesticides.

One last point — there are several designs for nuclear generating plants, only one of which pollutes public waters. Cooling towers have been used widely in England, and some built in the western U.S. The added cost of electricity over open circuit cooling is 1 per cent to the consumer.

Tempers are heating up like an atomic reactor, and The Citizens Committee To Save Cayuga Lake has employed a distinguished attorney to represent its case at a hearing before the Atomic Energy Commission. Before things boil over it might be well to keep in mind that no one is against progress — more jobs, more power for an expanding economy and population.

Rather, conservationists are for healthy environment, and we can have both. The battleground is on our doorstep, and the whole country is watching.

Assemblyman Frank Walkley Reports

Assemblyman Frank Walkley of Castle has announced in Albany that legislation of which he was a co-sponsor to make parents responsible for the malicious acts of vandalism of their children passed the Assembly by a vote of 122 to 27.

In making the announcement Assemblyman Walkley cited the rising rate of juvenile vandalism throughout the State and our community as creating the need for the legislation of this nature. He further pointed out that vandalism in school districts in 1968 cost New York City \$2,716,000; Buffalo, \$68,000; Rochester, \$40,000; and Syracuse, \$78,000. To cite the rapid acceleration of this problem the cost to the New York City school district in 1967 was \$1,950,000 or \$766,000 less than in 1968.

Under the terms of the legislation, a Family Court Judge could, as a condition of probation, order the guilty youth to perform services for the aggrieved party. The court could also order the child to pay the damage himself out of his own earnings up to Five Hundred Dollars.

A second section of the bill would create a new civil action where by a person whose property has been damaged or destroyed could bring an action in a court of competent jurisdiction against the parents of a child between the ages of 10 and 18 for damages resulting from the malicious willful acts of his child.

Assemblyman Walkley in discussing this aspect of the proposed law stated, "It is time parents realize that the responsibility of raising a child goes beyond housing, feeding and clothing this child. If parents are made to realize that they may be held financially responsible for these destructive acts of their children, perhaps they will pay attention to where their children are and what they are doing."

The measure now goes to the State Senate where similar legislation has already passed.
