

Allegany County Farm Bureau Members met in the Belmont Parish Hall Thursday evening at 7:30 p. m., for a Farmer-Businessmen dinner followed by a program which included John Follman, state organization director, as the main speaker.

Mr. Follman introduced his talk by audience participation using

by audience participation using wooden blocks to portray varying-monetary assets of the largest industries in the country. This demonstration led to the statement that "agriculture, leads all industries in the number of employees, amount spent for equipment, and in assets — while second in annual income — and fourth in sales."

income — and fourth in sales."

These plain statistics explode the myth that farmers are responsible for the high cost of food products because of high profits. Instead, farmers actually receive low renumeration on a per-hour basis for the work that they put in to harvest their farm products. The speaker cited that agriculture, employed 4,206,000 workers as compared to the next highest industry, textiles and apparel, which

compared to the next highest industry, textiles and apparel, which employed 2,393,000. The oil and coal industry which controls probably one of the biggest lobbies in Washington, employs the least number of people that were in the comparison group.

Mr. Follman discussed the farm "image" and explained that words had several different meanings so that when discussing farm probthat when discussing farm prob-lems, the farmers may mean one thing — while the public under-stands it in another sense of the actual meaning. He urged that more publicity be given to prob-lems facing the farmers and that the public be kept fully informed.

Donald McLeman, public relations chairman, then told the group that the Farm Bureau would again be sponsoring a booth at the Allegany County Fair in Angelica

Alleganv County Fair in Angelica and asked for suggestions from the members for making the display as attractive as possible, as well as volunteers to operate it.
