

Over 50% of the local register-

Over 50% of the local registered Republican Voters turned outfor the Frimary Election on Tuess day with a total of 316 voters casting their ballots from 605 registered eligible voters.

In the highly contested nomination for the three legislator posts for District No. 5, the total vote County-wise was: McNinch—731; Watson—536; Briggs—431: with the other candidates ending up with: Johnston—357; MacMichael 348; Gilbert—343; and Fasano—323.
