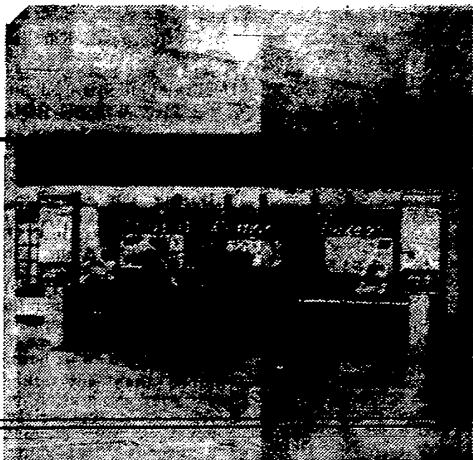

## "The Mall" Viewing Hill Cumorah Pageant Mall Display

"The Mall" in Horseheads is the third major center in the State of New York to exhibit a colorful exhibit depicting the famed Hill Cumorah Pageant, which is presented annually at Palmyra, New York.

This will be the second year that Horseheads has had the display on exhibit. The display has been on exhibit since Monday, June 16th, and will be in "The Mall" until Saturday, June 21st.

The elaborate display will feature photographs of Pageant scenes, murals, paintings, and a six foot color translite of a record keeping prophet in Ancient America. A full line of information pertaining to the dates, time, and background information on Pageant will also be available.

The 1969 Pageant is in the making to be the biggest and best of its 32 year history. Extensive work is now being done at the Hill Cumorah to enlarge and improve facilities for this year's production. A twenty foot area has been cleared down the right side of the hill to enlarge the staging area. The four giant lighting towers which house the spot-lights used each Pageant night, will be boosted 15 feet higher into the air. Also at present, the hill is being completely "rewired" with new electrical circuiting, and all new un-

derground cabling. All these improvements will help to make the 1969 Pageant the biggest and best yet produced.

The production will carry the traditional title of "America's Witness for Christ," and is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon). This unusual title is derived from the history for ancient America. The Pageant depicts the rise and fall of a Christian civilization of people who lived in the Americas from 600 B.C. to 421 A.D. During this time, prophets of God taught, exhorted, and led these people by the teachings of Christ. Records were kept by these valiant prophets, and in the year 1830, a resurrected messenger from the presence of God delivered the record to a youth named Joseph Smith. Smith translated the ancient work, and published it to the world as The Book of Mormon. The Book of Mormon supports the life and Biblical reality of Jesus Christ. Yet it was written and compiled thousands of miles away from Jerusalem on the American continent; hence the name, "America's Witness for Christ." There are now two ancient records in the world today, given us by Prophets of God, which testify of Christ. The Pageant will depict the Book of Mormon and some of the stimulating scenes taken therefrom.

Kindergarten Registration for Greenwood Central School was held June 17th from 7 to 8:30 P. M., in the Kindergarten room according to an announcement by Robert Hoagland, principal.

Letters have been sent to all parents in the district known to have children of kindergarten age, 5 years before December 1, requesting they bring birth certificate and immunization records at registration time.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Education held June 9 at the Greenwood Central School, it was voted to accept the group bread bid for the 1969-70 school year.

Mr. Hoagland reported to the Board that all vacancies for the 1969-70 school year appeared to be filled except a shared Home Economic teacher.

A special meeting of the Board of Education was set for June 25 for the approval of the budget to be presented to the tax payers at the annual meeting, July 8.

Summer School for grades 7-12 was discussed and it was voted by the Board to furnish transportation from the Greenwood area to Wellsville and return in connection with this. Students in grades 7-12 may take new work or make up work. Parents will be asked to pay the registration and summer
