since June is Dairy Month it's of milk and nonfat milk products, since June is Dairy month its fruits and vegetables. In addition, products, long favorites of the American consumer. The popularity of milk is deserved when one for infants, young children, and realises the nutritional contribution of sirls and women." realizes the nutritional contribution it makes to our food supply. For example, dairy foods — one of the four basic food groups give us:

· Over three-fourths of the national supply of calcium.

• More than a fifth of the protein.

· Over a third of the nation's phosphorus.

• More than two-fifths of our riboflavin supply. · About a seventh of the vita-

mins, in our food plus many other vitamins and minerals.

And weight watchers will be interested to know that with all this nourishment, milk and its products give us only 10% of the calories in our national food supply.

Numerous studies in years have demonstrated that the dietary habits of individuals from nearly all age, sex, and income groups can be improved, Calcium and iron often are below recommended levels.

In its annual publication, "How

Americans Use Their Dairy Foods," the National Dairy Council reports: "Several new sales cil reports: "Several new sales records for dalry foods were established last year. Sales of fluid nonfat and low fat milk, for example, were at an all-time high of 44.5 pints per person in 1968 — more than 5 pints above the 1967 sales level and more than dauble the powerful repts of sales. double the per capita rate of sales in 1960.

"Consumer demand for cheese was at a record level also . . . to a high of 10.1 pounds per person .

"Sales of ice cream and other frozen dairy foods were con-sumed in a record-setting 21.6 quarts per person during 1968," Ice cream sales alone repre-sented 15.6 quarts per person.

Butter remained unchanged at 4.9 pounds per person. Says NDC: "The long-term down-trend in per capita sales of butter appears to have leveled off." Fluid whole milk and fluid cream A recent U.S. Department of Agriculture report, for example, reads, in part:
