The booming popularity of trailer-boating has made skippers out of a lot of landlubbers, and this is the time of year vagabond boaters really hit the road. From Long Island to the St. Lawrence to the Niagara Frontier, garages and carports serve at drydocks for weekend boaters.

Long Island — private, village, township, and county, and is sold at a moderate price to raise money for conservation projects. If you're a vagabond boater, you will need one of these maps.

Long Island takes first place inthe number of boaters per square
mile, if my eyeball estimate is any
good. There are only three State
launching sites on the island, however, due to the large number of
city, county and private ramps
available.

But State facilities for trailerboaters are getting better on
Long Island, according to Edward
H. Moore, of the Conservation Department's Division of Motor
Boats. A new launching ramp and
parking lot are under construction
in Lindenhurst, at the foot of
Wellwood Avenue. Moore expects
it to be completed by the end of
the current boating season.

Also, Moore house the Freeport boat launching site will be improved this summer, but rehabilitation work will depend upon the Conservation Department's budget. The planned improvement would be paving the parking lot and ramps.

The Freeport ramp provides access to Great South Bay in Nassau County, and is located on Albany Avenue off Merick Road. The lot holds about 80 cars and trailers, and there are two ramps.

The Hecksher State Park launch-

The Hecksher State Park launching facility also provides access to Great South Bay, but in Suffolk

to Great South Bay, but in Suffolk County. It features parking for 25 cars and trailers, and is located on Hecksher Parkway off Southern State Parkway.

The third state boat launching site is at South Jamesport on Great Peconic Bay. The parking lot holds approximately 100 cars and trailers, and is found on Peconic Bay Boulevard.

In all, there are 135 State boat

In all, there are 135 State boat launching ramps scattered all over New York. The Conservation Department has a directory of these entitled New York State Boat Launching Sites. This may be obtained free by writing to the Conservation Department, State Campus, Albany, New York.
