Paul Kilbane was Grand Marchal of the Parade, with the entire proceedings being broadcast live over Radio Station WLSV with Anthony Cappadonio, Joseph Canale of Alfred; Robert Erwin, Wellsville, Scout Commissioner, and John King, acting as judges.
