Governor Announces "Out Reach Program"

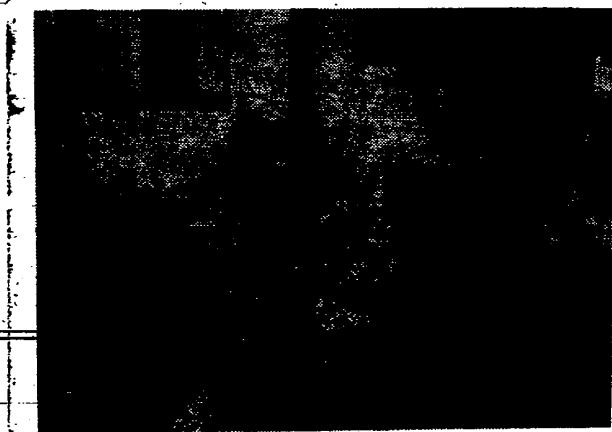
Governor Rockefeller has announced the active cooperation of the State Division of Veterans Affairs with the federal government's "Out Reach Program" to seek out educationally, disadvantaged servicemen being discharged and acquaint them with special educational opportunities available under the GI Bill.

Frank V. Votto is Director of the State unit. Educationally disadvantaged veterans, the Governor said, are those who have not completed their high school education.

Under the GI Bill, he said, they can receive financial assistance while completing high school, with no loss of their total entitlement for higher education. Single veterans attending classes full-time can receive \$130 a month. If married, they can receive up to \$175 a month, if they have two dependents, and \$10 more for each additional dependent.

Proportionately less is paid for three-quarter, half, or quarter time attendance.
