



Of all the fun-filled days our family has spent camping, the most memorable seem to involve fishing. These days would have to include a haul of perch from Lake Erie, cavorting smallmouth bass along Lake Ontario's shore, dredging bass off the bottom of Cranberry Lake, and drifting nymphs from brown trout in the Beaverkill.

Camping will take you where the fishing action is, we've found. The new dependable, easy-to-use gear will take rugged roads if necessary, will set up in time to catch the evening hatch, and permits you to live right on the fishing water. Our Apache tent-trailer has taken us through fair weather and foul on all kinds of trips, and has come to be the best friends this fisherman ever had.

Take the day we were barreling along home on the Thruway, and at Dunkirk the sweet aroma of grapes mingled with the haze of Indian Summer. Another season was about to close, so we asked ourselves, why the rush? We pulled into Erie County's Evangelina State Park, and from our car-top boat we filled a pail with fat perch. Not spectacular fishing to some, but for us an autumn day to savor and treasure. And the fact we were camping made it all possible.

The trip to Fort Niagara was a family sight-seeing outing, and we were camped at the Park's Four-Mile Creek Annex, Niagara County. This was in June after schools were out and the bass season newly opened. After our history lesson and visiting the excellent museum, we found the bass in relatively shallow water. They were hitting spinners and jigs.

We snagged bottom a lot, but when you hooked a fish he let you know about it. Whammo! Right up out of the water, shaking head and tail in all directions at the

same time. This was the trip that Tommy learned to handle airborne fish, and I picked up some pointers too. We were a happy pair heading to the trailer that night.

Scrappy smallmouth bass also provided a day to remember at Cranberry Lake Campsite, located about three miles south of Cranberry Lake Village in St. Lawrence County. Being in the western Adirondacks, we had a canoe and expected to find some brook trout in the area. But it was cold and rainy, and our trout fishing was disappointing. We lit a heater in the Apache, and did all our cooking and eating inside.

Our persistence paid off with warm sunny weather on the third day, so we decided on a family canoe jaunt to an island. I trolled a spoon off and on, and cast spinners during our lunch break with no success. Finally, I tried the old reliable, a nightcrawler fished on the bottom. In the lee of that island we had a circus with some of the deepest swimming bass I've ever run across. And only a heavy compass was there to catch them.

The map shows only one public campsite on Sullivan County — the Beaverkill, almost out of the county at the borders of Delaware and Ulster. The Beaverkill conjures up all sorts of emotions in a trout fisherman, so this spring we swung off Route 17 at Roscoe, drove through Rockland, and followed the park signs to a beautiful little campsite. You even have a view of a covered bridge.

The brown trout were falling for nymphs and I had an enjoyable day on this famous and beloved stream. But the fact that I could lie in bed and hear the Beaverkill gurgle and bubble at my doorstep, completed a boyhood dream.

Yep, campers are treated to a special kind of fishing, and you'd better try some soon.
