New Training Program Announced For GI's

Governor Rockefeller has announced that the State of New York is cooperating with the State of New Jersey and the U. S. Department of Defense in developing a program to train soon-to-be discharged soldiers for civilian employment as municipal policemen.
Servicemen who are accompted

ployment as municipal policemen.
Servicemen who are accepted into the program will be trained at Fort Dix, N. J., which serves as a separation center for U.S. Army personnel from New York and other Notheastern states. Those who successfully complete the 240-hour municipal police training program at Ft. Dix will be certified as eligible for immediate appointment by local governments as local policemen in either New York State or New Jersey.

"This program". Governor

"This program", Governor Rockefeller announced, "will help to relieve the shortage of qualif-New York State municipalities. The program will also assist returning servicemen in finding infemediate civilian employment in a vital field of public service."

vital field of public service."

The program is expected to provide a substantial number of fully-trained police recruits who would become eligible each month for appointment as local police officers either in New York State or New Jersey. The 453 local police agencies in New York State (in addition to sheriffs departments) which employ full-time personnel, currently have numerous vacancies due largely to the shortage of qualified police recruits.

The Division for Local Police

The Division for Local Police of the New York State Office for Local Government will certify those servicemen who complete the police training program at Fort Dix as having met the requirements of New York State's mandatant manifest police heads. ments of New York State's mandatory municipal police basic training course. Local police recruits in New York State are required to complete the 240-hour basic training course developed by the Division for Local Police in creder to be eligible for permanent civil service appointment by any county, city, town or village in the state.

the state.

The State Department of Civil Service has developed procedures whereby municipalities in the State will be able to recruit these trained and certified servicemen for immediate police duty, without waiting for civil service examinations and without having to pay the police recruits during their basic training period as is now the case.

Municipalities which participate in this program may wish to elim-inate their local residence require-ments for police officers in order to broaden their choice of appli-

cants.

The curriculm for the police training program at Fort Dix has been developed cooperatively by the Division for Local Police, the State Department of Civil Service, the New Jersey police training and civil service agencies, and the Defense Department to ensure that the basic police training requirements of both states will be met. Applicants for the program are to be screened to determine that they meet minimum educational and medical standards, and checks will be made for possible arrest records.

The basic police training course

The basic police training course administered by the Division for Local Police provides 240 hours of classroom and field training in such subjects are: community relations; laws of arrest, search and seizure; traffic control; accident investigation; the patrol function; emergency aid to persons; and recognising and handling abnormal persons. Bids To Oven For Two Highway Projects

Governor Rockefeller has mounced that the State Dept of Transportation will open bids on August 28 for two highway pro-

on August 28 for two highway projects in Allegany and Cattaraugus Counties with a total estimated cost of almost \$2.5 million.

The State's share of the proposed contracts will be paid with funds from the Transportation Bond Issue approved by New York in 1967.

The estimate is \$1,075,000 for reconstruction of Route 17 for

reconstruction of Route 17 for 0.7-mile in the Village of Wellsville, Allegany County. A fourlane divided roadway will be built from Main Street easterly to the railroad overpass, partly on new alignment south of Dyke Street. The project will include demolition of buildings preparatory to reconstruction of combined Routes 17 and 19 on new alignment west of Main Street.

17 and 19 on new alignment west of Main Street.

In Cattaraugus County, resurfacing of Routes 16 for 5.25 miles in the Town of Franklinville, to include widening near intersections, is estimated to cost \$1,394.000. Work will extend from the Ischua town line northerly to the south line of the Village of Franklinville. The highway will be resurfaced with asphalt and safety turning lanes added on the approaches to seven intersecting roads.
