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# 1969-70 Small Game Season Announced

The State Conservation Depart-The State Conservation Department today announced details of the 1969-70 small game hunting season. The more than half million small game hunters in the state will find an important change this year \_\_\_ establishment of a new southeastern zone.

The new southeastern sone covers most of the southern Hudson Valley with the following boundaries — all that area (exclusive of Valley with the rollowing boundaries — all that area (exclusive of Long Island) lying south and east of a continuous line extending along Route 209 from the New York-Pennsylvania boundry (at Port Jervis in Orange County) to Route 199 (north of Kingston, in Ulster County) and along Route 199 to the east shore of the Hudson River; then north along the east shore of the Hudson to the Rensselaer — Washington County line and slong it to the New York-Vermont boundary.

The southeastern zone, therefore, includes all of Columbia, Dutchess, Putnam, Rensselaer, Rockland and Westchester Coun-

Dutchess, Putnam, Rensselaer Rockland and Westchester Coun-ties, as wen as portions of Grange Sullivan and Ulster Counties.

Explaining the reason for creating the new southeastern zone, Albert G. Hall, Director of the Division of Fish and Game, noted, "The most effective game management is possible when seasons are closely allied to unique local situations. This is the case with the southeastern zone. It is an area of relatively intensive agricultural development and consequent need of relatively intensive agricultural development and consequent need for fall harvesting of some crops. Setting separate seasons in this area provides hunting opportunities for many sportsmen without unduly interfering with essential farm operations. Further, the hunting season will open after foliage cover has moderated somewhat, making game easier to see. This is the result of continuing cooperation among the representatives of organized sportsmen's groups agricultural interests and the Denartment."

Hunting hours in the State ramain from sunrise to sunset. These hours apply to woodcock, even though it is a migratory bird. For other migratory birds, shooting hours are one half-hour before sunrise and sunset.

There is an unusually early opening of September 1 for rails and gallinules throughout the State with the exception of Long Island where it opens a week later, on September 8. The season closes November 9 throughout the State. This unusually early opening is due to the fact that, in accord with Federal regulations, these migratory birds may be hunted for 70 consecutive days. If the season were to start later, the birds probably would have moved out of the area well before the end of the season. Game specialists in the Department remind hunters that the earlier opening, when much foliage will still be on trees, will emphasize the need for a well-trained dog to aid in locating downed birds.

Woodcock and snipe also have September opening September 22 in the Northernwone and in October in the rest of the State. Dates for the State. Dates for the State. Dates for the Federal government and will be announced in late August.

Hunters are advised to check the 1969-70 Hunting and Fishing Guide for specific references to seasons, bag fimits and area descriptions. The guide will be available at license-issuing agents in late summer.
