The Dedication and Open House of Stubben County Infirmary was held under sunny skies at Beth Saturday afternoon. Frank Wolfanger, Commissioner of Public Welfare of Stubben County, was chairman of the program. This culminated 15 years of planning by the Board of Supervisors. In 1917 the resolution was passed authorizing the construction of the new 105 bed Extended Care Facility. The estimated cost was \$2,895,754.00 financed by one third Hill-Burton Funds, one third State Funds and one third local funds. The building is split level design and contains five buildings that will supply much light for the patients. Some features are three nursing stations, laboratory and X-ray, Physical and Occupational Therapy, 200 TV in the TV Rooms, Barber and Beauty Shop, Chapel, Outdoor Court for patients, Parking Space for visitors, Paging and Sounding system, Telephone Conduit system, Fire Detectors, 7 Bath Tubs, 19 Showers, 3 Sits Baths and provision for future additions. C. Eugene Davis is Chairman of Social Services Committee. The program opened and closed by selections by Haverling High School Band, directed by Luther Hoffman. Flag Raising Ceremony was by Bath Boy Scouts. The invocation was given by the Rev. Clair Statham, Pastor of the United Methodist Church at Hammondport and Benediction by Fr. John P. O'Malley of Bath. Welcome was by Howard Hunsburt, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors. Notable guests were introduced by Frank Wolfanger, Commissioner of Social Services. Mr. John Wager of Albany, representing Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller, spoke on the progress in social services in the State in recent years. Robert McDowell, Judge Surrogate Court was the guest speaker. He was Chairman of the Board of Supervisors when the project was under discussion and finally voted. After the Corner Stone Laying and Ribbon Cutting, guests were invited to tour the new building. Among the guides were Mr. and Mrs. Clair Austin. He was employed on the construction and Mrs. Austin works in the 20 bed infirmary. Orville Matthews and Mrs. Grace Young were in attendance for the ceremonies.

18th Woodmen's Carnival To Be Held August 1 - 2

Cherry Springs State Park near Galeton, Pa., will be the scene of Eastern United State's most unusual summer carnival - the 18th Penn-York Woodmen's Carnival, August 1 and 2.

Preparations underway promise to make this unique public attraction the biggest and best logging show ever held. There is no admission charge and the public is invited to witness demonstrations of log rolling, tree felling, sawing and other skills used in providing timber to meet America's growing need of wood products.

R. E. Kramer, general chairman of the carnival, reports that more than \$1 million of logging and sawmilling equipment will be on display under actual working conditions. A special award will be made to the exhibitor doing the best job of promoting safe work practices in woods and mills.

Each day's activities will begin at 9 a. m. in the park, located on State Route 44. The site is eight miles west of Galeton, Pa., and 15 miles south of Coudersport, Pa. In addition to free admission, there is free parking. Camping facilities in the park are excellent. Numerous motels and other accommodations are located in the area, but confirmed advance reservations are advised.

A highlight will be the presentation of American Tree Farm awards to woodland owners in recognition of their practice of good forest management for continuous production of timber as a crop. A national program of the American Forest Institute, the Tree Farm system in Pennsylvania is sponsored by the Pennsylvania Forest Industries Committee with the cooperation of the Pennsylvania Department of Forests and Waters and the Pennsylvania Forestry Association.

Contestants will compete for \$1,500 in prizes in horse pulling, log rolling, sawing and chopping, tree felling and other competitions open to woods workers. For the public, a beautiful cherry desk made from wood grown in the forests of Cherry Springs State Park and valued at \$300, will be given away. Only food and beverages will be

sold in the park. Mr. Kramer said the carnival, which attracted 35,000 persons last year, is held "to give woods workers an opportunity to display their skills and talent and to dramatize the importance of the forest industry". Receipts from exhibitors fees go toward purchasing artifacts for the Pennsylvania Lumberman's Museum now under construction.

A unique record recapping many of the sounds and voices of the successful mission of Apollo will soon be offered to the public by Marine Midland Banks, Incorporated.

According to Marine Midland Assistant Vice President, James A. Graham, the banking system has obtained the exclusive New York State rights to the CBS News-produced record, "Man On the Moon".

Commentary is provided by CBS News Correspondent Walter Cronkite. Actual astronaut-mission control voice recordings are used to trace the historic mission from pre-lift-off through moon walk, blast-off from the Tranquility Base, Eagle-Columbia orbital rendezvous, splash-down and aftermath.

All the drama and all the significant moments are compressed on both sides of this 7 inch, 33 1/2 rpm Collector's item available for 50c to holders of Marine Midland Master Charge Cards and to persons opening charge card accounts, Graham added.

Records are expected to be available at all Marine Midland offices in the 140 communities served by the banking system on August 4.

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
