The double ring ceremony was performed by the Rev. Gerald Wolter, pastor of the United Methodist Church of Andover and Greenwood, and assisted by Dr. Alfred J. Gross of the University Methodist Church in Buffalo. The altar was decorated with baskets of yellow and white gladioli and lilies of the valley and white satin bows decorated the center aisle of the church. Mrs. Lawrence Godown was organist, and accompanied Richard Godown, soloist.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a formal floor length Empire gown of silk organza, fashioned with scalloped neckline, long sleeves and A-line skirt. October 1 - 12, Part of Delaware County. (See Guide) 1 in fall.

November 3 - 15, Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Chemung, Schuyler, and Steuben Counties as well as part of Erie County, 1 in fall.

May 4 - May 9, bearded turkeys only in area to be announced, 1 in spring.

October 1 - March 15, Upstate except southeastern zone, no limit.

October 20 - March 15, Southeastern zone, no limit.

Rails
(King, Clapper, Sora and Virginia)

September 1 - November 9, Upstate; King & Clapper, 7 per day, 14 in possession, singly or in the aggregate.

Sora & Virginia, 25 per day, 25 in possession, singly or in the aggregate.

Woodcock

September 22 - November 25, Northern zone, 5 per day, 10 in possession.

October 1 - November 25, Southern zone except southeastern zone, 5 per day, 10 in possession.
